(In-person tour) Although today's Meatpacking District is known for its trendy restaurants and avant-





The Pirate's Wife: Sarah Kid and the Golden Age of Piracy in New York City, Tuesday, February 21, 2023



6:30PM - 8:00PM. Captain Kidd was one of the most notorious pirates to ever sail the seas. But few know the behind-the-scenes player who enabled his plundering and helped him outpace his enemies. That accomplice was his wife Sarah, a well-to-do woman whose extraordinary life is a lesson in reinvention and resourcefulness. Twice widowed by twenty-one and operating

within the strictures of polite society in seventeenthand eighteenth-century New York, Sarah secretly aided and abetted her husband, fighting off his accusers alongside him. Marshaling newly discovered sources from archives in London, New York and Boston, historian and journalist **Daphne Palmer Geanacopoulos** re-

constructs her life and places it within the city, a "utopia" for pirates in the Golden Age of Piracy. Pinky's Space says the city Department of Transportation on Oct. 27, without notice, demolished the 30-foot outdoor dining shed built during the pandemic under the city's Open Restaurant Program, a Manhattan Supreme Court lawsuit filed Thursday charged. The suit is seeking \$615,000.

Pinky's — a self-described "food art-space" on East First Street and First Avenue that opened in 2017 — says it invested \$90,000 to build an outdoor dining area and garden replete with "a crystal chandelier, hanging disco ball, neon lights and works of art to parallel its indoor space," the filing claims.

Old News

The story of the twin houses of Commerce Street In the West Village, at that wonderful cow-path bend where Commerce Street winds around to merge into Barrow Street, sit two stately antebellum homes. Numbers 39 and 41 Commerce Street, built in 1831 when the village of Greenwich was transitioning from a suburb to part of the larger city, are twin separate stand-alone houses, joined together by a small shared garden behind a concrete wall.





These two beauties remind me of sisters—and a legend about two sisters may be in their history.

The story has it that the houses were built by a sea captain who had two feuding daughters. The daughters wouldn't speak to each other, so he built identical houses for them with the shared garden, hoping they would get along again. Who doesn't want to believe a story like that? Unfortunately, no evidence supports it.

A New Jersey milkman named Jacob Huyler is credited with building the twin houses, which originally stood only two stories high. Huyler never lived in New York, but he did not sell the build-

ings—he held them for rental," wrote **Christopher Gray** in the *New York Times* in 1996. One of those renters was listed at the time as a captain.

By the end of the 19th century, the mansard roofs and a third floor were added, and both homes were carved



up into rooming houses for artists and workingclass residents. Today in a pricier Greenwich Vil-

lage, the houses are single-family residences again. They retain their 19th century loveliness, and strolloften stop ers and stare. These beauties twin are emblems of a much different New York, when a legend about a sea captain using real estate to help bring two sisters together doesn't seem like
